Dear Ms. Said-Abdelwahed:

Attached is a consultation list of tribes with traditional lands or cultural places located within the boundaries of the above referenced counties or projects.

Government Codes §65352.3 and §65352.4 require local governments to consult with California Native American tribes identified by the Native American Heritage Commission (NAHC) for the purpose of avoiding, protecting, and/or mitigating impacts to cultural places when creating or amending General Plans, Specific Plans and Community Plans.

Public Resources Codes §21080.3.1 and §21080.3.2 requires public agencies to consult with California Native American tribes identified by the Native American Heritage Commission (NAHC) for the purpose of avoiding, protecting, and/or mitigating impacts to tribal cultural resources as defined, for California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) projects.

The law does not preclude local governments and agencies from initiating consultation with the tribes that are culturally and traditionally affiliated within your jurisdiction. The NAHC believes that this is the best practice to ensure that tribes are consulted commensurate with the intent of the law.

Best practice for the AB52 process and in accordance with Public Resources Code §21080.3.1(d), is to do the following:

Within 14 days of determining that an application for a project is complete or a decision by a public agency to undertake a project, the lead agency shall provide formal notification to the designated contact of, or a tribal representative of, traditionally and culturally affiliated California Native American tribes that have requested notice, which shall be accomplished by means of at least one written notification that includes a brief description of the proposed project and its location, the lead agency contact information, and a notification that the California Native American tribe has 30 days to request consultation pursuant to this section.

The NAHC also recommends, but does not require that lead agencies include in their notification letters, information regarding any cultural resources assessment that has been completed on the area of potential affect (APE), such as:

- 1. The results of any record search that may have been conducted at an Information Center of the California Historical Resources Information System (CHRIS), including, but not limited to:
 - A listing of any and all known cultural resources have already been recorded on or adjacent to the APE, such as known archaeological sites;
 - Copies of any and all cultural resource records and study reports that may have been provided by the Information Center as part of the records search response;
 - Whether the records search indicates a low, moderate or high probability that unrecorded cultural resources are located in the APE; and
 - If a survey is recommended by the Information Center to determine whether previously unrecorded cultural resources are present.
- 2. The results of any archaeological inventory survey that was conducted, including:
 - Any report that may contain site forms, site significance, and suggested mitigation measures.

All information regarding site locations, Native American human remains, and associated funerary objects should be in a separate confidential addendum, and not be made available for public disclosure in accordance with Government Code Section 6254.10.

- 3. The result of the Sacred Lands File (SLF) check conducted through the Native American Heritage Commission was <u>positive</u>. Please contact the Gabrieleno Band of Mission Indians Kizh Nation on the attached list for more information.
- 4. Any ethnographic studies conducted for any area including all or part of the potential APE; and
- 5. Any geotechnical reports regarding all or part of the potential APE.

Lead agencies should be aware that records maintained by the NAHC and CHRIS is not exhaustive, and a negative response to these searches does not preclude the existence of a tribal cultural resource. A tribe may be the only source of information regarding the existence of a tribal cultural resource.

This information will aid tribes in determining whether to request formal consultation. In the event, that they do, having the information beforehand well help to facilitate the consultation process.

If you receive notification of change of addresses and phone numbers from tribes, please notify the NAHC. With your assistance we can assure that our consultation list remains current.

The City of Walnut (lead agency) is reviewing an application for an approximately 23-acre project located between Valley Boulevard to the south, S. Lemon Avenue to the west, Paseo Del Prado to the north, and an existing industrial development to the east in the City of Walnut, Los Angeles County (project site).

The project site is comprised of 20 parcels [Assessor's Parcel Numbers (APNs) 8720-024-058, 8720-034-001, 8720-034-002, 8720-034-003, 8720-034-004, 8720-034-005, 8720-034-035, 8720-034-016, 8720-034-017, 8720-034-018, 8720-034-019, 8720-034-020, 8720-034-030, 8720-034-031, 8720-034-032, 8720-034-033, 8720-034-034, 8720-034-024, 8720-034-025, 8720-034-026 (see Figure 1). The property immediately northeast of the intersection of S. Lemon Avenue and Valley Boulevard is not a part of the project site. The property immediately southeast of the intersection of Paseo Del Prado and Paseo Tesoro is not a part of the project site. The current project site is developed with an existing industrial business.

The Applicant proposes to demolish the existing structures, which total 330,000 square – feet of building area. As part of the proposed project, the asphalt on-site would be demolished, and the parcels would be graded, paved, and hardscaped for internal roadways and trenched for water, sewer, and storm water utilities for the proposed development. The proposed project includes development of four (4) concrete tilt-up buildings that would encompass a total of 414,778 square – feet of building space consisting of 392,488 square – feet of warehousing space, and 22,290 square – feet of office space.

The entire plan area is zoned Light Manufacturing (M-1) with a land use designation of "Industrial" which allows for light manufacturing, commercial storage, craftsman and artisan assembly and production, limited vehicle service repair, limited commercial retail and office uses. The proposed project would not require a change in land use designation or zoning.

The City has started the process of preparing a Supplemental Environmental Impact Report (SEIR) for the proposed project. The City of Walnut is notifying local Native American tribes, pursuant to California Public Resource Code Section 21080.3.1 (AB 52). The City recognizes that "Native American tribes traditionally and culturally affiliated with a geographic area may have expertise concerning their tribal cultural resources that may inform the lead agency in its identification and determination of the significance of tribal cultural resources." As such, the City is soliciting input, and, if necessary, consultation with your tribe to identify any potential environmental impacts from the proposed project.

The Native American Heritage Commission (NAHC) was contacted on April 11, 2023, to perform a search of the Sacred Lands File. The NAHC responded on April 21, 2023, and reported positive results for Native American sacred sites and/or heritage resources located within the project area and the NAHC provided contact information for the Gabrieleno Band of Mission Indians – Kizh Nation for more information. The Kizh Nation is noted as being able to provide additional information.

A record search was conducted at the South-Central Coastal Information Center (SCCIC) located at California State University, Fullerton on April 11, 2023 for the project site and a half-mile radius. Results of the record search indicate that no previous studies have been completed within the project site while three previous studies have been completed within a half-mile radius from the project site. No cultural resources have been recorded within the project site. A total of three cultural resources were previously documented within the half-mile search radius from the project site, consisting of lithic scatters, two historic built resources, and the Union Pacific Railroad.
