Title: Hamilton City Flood Damage and Ecosystem Restoration Project

Proponent: Central Valley Flood Protection Board

Location: Sovereign land in the Sacramento River along the east bank of the Sacramento River beneath the Gianella Bridge, Hamilton City, Glenn County.

Description: Authorize the amendment of Lease Number 9606, a General Lease – Public Agency Use, effective October 25, 2022, to extend the lease term from 25 years to 49 years, from February 27, 2045, to February 27, 2069, and to revise certain lease provisions related to construction and maintenance of the rock slope protection and restoration of habitat on the waterside levee slope.

This is to advise that the California State Lands Commission, as Lead Agency Responsible Agency, approved the above described project on October 25, 2022 and made the following determinations regarding the Project.

- 1) The project will will not have a significant effect on the environment.
- 2) An Addendum to an Environmental Impact Report (EIR) was prepared and certified pursuant to the provisions of CEQA.
- 3) Mitigation measures were were not made a condition of the approval of the project.
- 4) A mitigation reporting or monitoring plan was or was not adopted for this project.
- 5) A Statement of Overriding Considerations was was not adopted for the project.
- 6) Findings were were not made pursuant to the provisions of CEQA.

The lead agency for the project, Central Valley Flood Protection Board (Board), certified the Environmental Impact Statement/Report (EIS/EIR) and an Addendum to the EIS/EIR and approved the Project on July 16, 2004, and approved the project on June 20, 2019, respectively.
