Title: Tomales Bay Vessel Management Plan

Applicant: Eric Holmes

Location: Sovereign Land in Tomales Bay, adjacent to Teachers Beach, near Inverness, Marin County

Description: The Tomales Bay Vessel Management Plan (TBVMP) is the result of a long-term multi-agency effort to streamline and coordinate vessel management activities for the benefit of the public. The TBVMP aims to improve water quality, protect wildlife and habitat, protect public health and ensure recreational opportunities in Tomales Bay. It also implements the mandates and regulations of both Gulf of the Farallones National Marine Sanctuary and California State Lands Commission (Commission). The Commission action is issuing a 10-year General Lease- Recreational Use for the installation and use of one mooring buoy consistent with the TBVMP.

This is to advise that the California State Lands Commission, as Lead Agency Responsible Agency, approved the above described project on April 2, 2025 and made the following determinations regarding the project.

- 1) The project will will not have a significant effect on the environment.
- 2) A Negative Declaration was prepared for this project pursuant to the provisions of CEQA.
