Title: The Low-Energy Offshore Geophysical Permit Program (OGPP) Update

Applicant: CSA Ocean Sciences, Incorporated

Location: Offshore waters (to 3 nautical miles) from Mexico border to Oregon border

Description: The California State Lands Commission has statutory authority, pursuant to Public Resources Code section 6826, to issue geophysical permits in State waters to qualified permittees for the use of low energy geophysical equipment to perform geophysical surveys of the ocean bottom, subject to specified terms and conditions. The State Lands Commission action is issuing a 3-year non-exclusive geophysical survey permit.

This is to advise that the California State Lands Commission, as Lead Agency Responsible Agency, approved the above-described project on December 5, 2023, and made the following determinations regarding the project.

- 1) The project will will not have a significant effect on the environment.
- 2) A Mitigated Negative Declaration (MND) was prepared for this project pursuant to the provisions of CEQA.
- 3) Mitigation measures were were not made a condition of the approval of the project.
- 4) A mitigation reporting or monitoring plan was or was not adopted for this project.
- 5) A Statement of Overriding Considerations was was not adopted for the project.
- 6) Findings were were not made pursuant to the provisions of CEQA.

The MND and Mitigation Monitoring Program (MMP) were prepared for this project by the California State Lands Commission and adopted on September 20, 2013, as modified by the addendum to the MND and revised General Permit and MMP, adopted on April 23, 2014.
