Chapter 1 INTRODUCTION

The California Highway Patrol (CHP) has prepared this Final Environmental Impact Report (FEIR) to provide the public, responsible agencies, and trustee agencies with information about the potential environmental effects of construction and operation of the proposed CHP Santa Fe Springs Area Office Replacement Project (Proposed Project). This document was prepared in accordance with the requirements of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) of 1970 (as amended) and the State CEQA Guidelines (14 California Code of Regulations [CCR] Section 15000 *et seq.*).

FORMAT AND ORGANIZATION OF THE FEIR

This FEIR contains the following components:

Chapter 1 *Introduction.* This chapter describes the organization of the FEIR, and its preparation, review, and certification process. Chapter 1 also presents a list of agencies and persons commenting on the Draft Environmental Impact Report (DEIR), in compliance with CEQA requirements.

Chapter 2 *Comments and Responses.* CEQA requires that written responses be prepared for all substantive comments received that raise environmental issues. Therefore, Chapter 2 contains all of the comments on the DEIR received by CHP and CHP's responses to those comments.

Chapter 3 *Revisions to the DEIR*. Chapter 3 presents revisions made to the DEIR as a result of oral and written comments received on it, as well as corrections of typographical errors and other minor errors in the text that were identified after the DEIR was published.

Chapter 4 *Report Preparation.* Chapter 4 lists the individuals involved in preparing this FEIR and their responsibilities.

Chapter 5 *References*. Chapter 5 provides the references cited in this FEIR.

Appendix A *DEIR Notices and Mailing List.* This appendix contains the Notice of Availability (NOA) of the DEIR, the Notice of Completion for the DEIR that was sent to the State Office of Planning and Research (OPR), the newspaper advertisement announcing the availability of the DEIR, emails to various agencies, Native American tribes, and adjacent properties announcing the cancelled public meeting for the Proposed Project, a Portable Document Format (PDF) version of the Proposed Project's website homepage, and the distribution mailing list for the NOA of the DEIR.

Appendix B *Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Plan.* This appendix contains the mitigation monitoring and reporting plan (MMRP) required under CEQA Section 21081.6. The MMRP plan identifies the mitigation measures that are proposed to be adopted in the approval action, the monitoring and reporting actions that shall be carried out, and the monitoring schedule.

PUBLIC REVIEW OF THE DEIR

An NOA was circulated to the public; to local, state, and federal agencies; and to other interested parties through direct mailing, by publication in a general circulation newspaper, by posting on CHP's website, and by hard copy made available at the Los Angeles County Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk's office. This NOA initiated a 45-day public review period, beginning on February 21, 2020, and ending April 6, 2020. During this time, the DEIR was made available for review on CHP's website, at the California Highway Patrol office in Sacramento (601 N. Seventh Street), at the California Highway Patrol Santa Fe Springs Office in Santa Fe Springs (10051 Orr and Day Road), at the State of California Department of General Services offices in West Sacramento (707 Third Street, 4th Floor), at the Norwalk Library in Norwalk (12350 Imperial Highway), and via mail by specific request.

The various DEIR notices and the associated mailing list are provided in Appendix A of this FEIR.

PUBLIC MEETING ON THE DEIR

CHP cancelled a planned public meeting on the DEIR due to the global Coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic, which resulted in the temporary closure of the event venue and statewide prohibitions against large gatherings of people. The public meeting was scheduled to be held in Santa Fe Springs, California, on March 17, 2020, at the Town Center Hall (11740 E. Telegraph Road). A sign was posted outside of the Town Center Hall that notified the public about the cancelled meeting, and the project's website was also updated to announce the cancellation. As stated above, emails announcing the cancellation were sent to various agencies, Native American tribes, and properties adjacent to the Proposed Project. The emails can be found in Appendix A of the FEIR. CHP did not receive any questions about the meeting cancellation.

Although there is not a legal requirement under CEQA to hold a public meeting for an Environmental Impact Report (EIR), a 45-day public review period was still set in place, and comments were still received.

PREPARATION OF THE FEIR

As stated previously, CEQA requires that an FEIR include responses to comments regarding the DEIR. Therefore, this FEIR includes Chapter 2 *Comments and Responses*. In addition, revisions are discussed in Chapter 3 *Revisions to the DEIR* as follows: text that has been deleted is shown in strikethrough, and text that has been inserted is shown underlined. The FEIR, along with the DEIR, constitute the entire EIR for the purposes of CEQA compliance.

The FEIR will be distributed to public agencies that provided comments 10 days before certification of the EIR. At the close of the 10-day public agency review period, CHP will

review the EIR, consider staff recommendations and public comment, and decide whether to certify the EIR and approve or deny the Proposed Project.

After certification of the EIR, and if CHP approves the Proposed Project, CHP will file a Notice of Determination (NOD) with OPR.

On behalf of the Los Angeles Conservancy, thank you for the opportunity to comment on the Draft Environmental Impact Report (DEIR) for the CHP Santa Fe Springs Area Office Replacement Project (Project) located on the Department of State Hospitals – Metropolitan Campus (formerly Metropolitan State Hospital, MSH). As stated in the DEIR, the Project would have significant and unavoidable impacts to the National Register of Historic Places and California Register of Historic Resources (NRHP/CRHR) eligible Metropolitan State Hospital Historic District. In addition to its eligibility as a historic district, the hospital campus has been identified as an eligible California Historic Landmark.

A-1

The hospital campus, located at 11401 Bloomfield Avenue in Norwalk, was first identified as an eligible historic district at both the National and State levels in 1980 through executive order B-64-80. In 2017, JRP Historical Consulting, LLC confirmed the 1980 determination adding eligibility as a California Historic Landmark. Their findings are detailed in the *Historical Resource Inventory and Evaluation Report Metropolitan State Hospital* prepared by the state's Department of General Services (DGS).

Significance

The campus was originally known as the Norwalk State Hospital when established in 1915, and later as the Metropolitan State Hospital (MSH) before acquiring its current title. It was the sixth state hospital to be built





and dedicated to mental illness. The original campus encompassed some 300 acres on the border of Norwalk and Santa Fe Springs. Significant as a "Cottage Plan" design, the hospital proved forward thinking and state-of-the-art for its time. Through its "Cottage Plan" design, the hospital broke away from the established congregate asylums of the day. MSH introduced human scale buildings that combined expansive lawns and pathways to offer patients a more home-like feeling.

Historically, the campus was accesses by two entrances along Bloomfield Avenue. These access points are connected by a road which rings the campus. Between the two entrances is an expansive lawn creating a bucolic vista from the street and paved road within the campus.

When established, the state intended the hospital to accommodate up to 2,000 patients as a way to alleviate other hospitals in the system. However, development at MSH was gradual at first but accelerated in the 1920s. By the end of the 1930s MSH had 47 buildings and a fully developed circulation pattern with walking paths, and a paved road. Matured foliage planted by patients dotted the campus. Like other hospitals of the period, labor was considered essential therapy, and patients were put to work on the institution's construction. By 1940 patient numbers had grown to 2,292 live-in residents.

In 2017, JRP confirmed the earlier determination that the MSH campus is eligible for listing in the NRHP/CRHR under criterion A/1 for "the important role it played in the evolution of public institutional mental health care as the first state hospital campus to be organized entirely around the Cottage Plan model." The district was also determined eligible under Criterion C/3 as a relatively intact example of Cottage Plan institutional design, which opened during the peak of the concept's popularity and on which its principles were fully realized. The DEIR further notes that JRP determined the property eligible as a California Historical Landmark because of its status as the first fully-realized, most significant, and last surviving Cottage Plan institution in California.

JRP assigned a period of significance between 1915-1950, reflecting the 35-year period of development on the campus. Sixty-two individual elements comprise the Metropolitan State Hospital Historic District. As stated in the DEIR, JRP identified character-defining elements of the grounds as "central green spaces featuring concrete pathways lined with period-style light standards; the campus's open and scenic views featuring expansive lawn, mature trees, and shrubs, the asphalt perimeter roads around treatment areas and driveways leading to residences."

The proposed Project site is located within the largest and most prominent lawn positioned between the two original entrances.

A-1 cont. Early twentieth-century hospital campuses, such as this one, are increasingly rare and threatened historic resources. The MSH campus shares similar histories and properties to the Los Angeles County-owned and operated Rancho Los Amigos campus in nearby Downey. Like the Metropolitan State Hospital, Rancho Los Amigos adhered to "Garden City" design concepts that was realized through patient labor. The Conservancy has worked for over ten years to save the campus as it is a critical link in the important history of California's healthcare system.

I. Proposed Project Poses Impacts to Cultural Resources

As stated in the DEIR, the Project will have significant and unavoidable impacts to the district's integrity and ability to convey significance. The Project plans to construct a new single-story CHP office with support structures on six acres of lawn along Bloomfield Avenue. Development of the current Project Site will permanently alter the campus's most prominent vista. Such expanses are core to the campus's integrity as a "Cottage Plan" hospital. Constructing the new CHP Area Office will significantly impact the district's ability to convey significance through design, setting, and feeling.

A-2

In addition to the proposed Project, the consolidation of police operations was approved in April 2019. The new police office will be constructed eighty feet south of the Project Site along Bloomfield Avenue. To make way for construction, the state plans to demolish five contributing buildings to the eligible historic district. Despite its planned demolitions, this project was deemed to have less than significant impacts due to its location on the campus. We believe that demolition of any district contributors will have significant impacts, especially when considering the current CHP Santa Fe Springs Area Office Replacement Project

Under CEQA Guidelines Section 15378, "project" is defined as "the whole of an action, which has a potential for resulting in either a direct physical change in the environment, or a reasonably foreseeable indirect physical change in the environment..." An accurate and complete project description is essential to a legally sufficient EIR:

A curtailed or distorted project description may stultify the objectives of the [CEQA] reporting process. Only through an accurate view of the project may affected outsiders and public decision makers balance the proposal's benefit against its environmental cost, consider mitigation measures, assess the advantage of terminating the proposal (i.e., the 'no project' alternative) and weigh other alternatives in the balance.

Accordingly, a public agency cannot subdivide a single project into smaller individual subprojects in order to avoid reviewing the impacts of the project as a whole, or to eliminate potentially feasible alternatives from consideration.

If the Proposed Project is approved, the total combined project area of the two projects will encompass a total of thirteen acres along the district's Bloomfield Avenue property line. While



Horizon Water and Environment, LLC identified the impacts of the project as significant and unavoidable, the DEIR fails to adequately address the cumulative impacts of both projects on cont. \(\text{ the campus.} \)

Project Alternatives Do Not Mitigate Adverse Impacts to the Eligible Historic П.

A key policy under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) is the lead agency's duty to "take all action necessary to provide the people of this state with historic environmental qualities and preserve for future generations examples of major periods of California history."4 To this end, CEQA "requires public agencies to deny approval of a project with significant adverse effects when feasible alternatives or feasible mitigation measures can substantially lessen such effects."5 The fact that an environmentally superior alternative may be more costly or fails to meet all project objectives does not necessarily render it infeasible under CEQA.6 Reasonable alternatives must be considered "even if they substantially impede the project or are more costly." Likewise, findings of alternative feasibility or infeasibility must be supported by substantial evidence.8

A-3

The DEIR explores four project alternatives that include the "No Project Alternative." Two of the alternatives explored Project Site alternatives. As mentioned in the DEIR, neither property owner would sell their land to the applicant. Has the acquisition of alternative sites been fully explored and demonstrated that owners refuse to sell? The record should indicate that this possibility has been fully vetted and explored. An agency cannot cure an EIR's informational defects by relying upon information or evidence that is not contained in the EIR.

Of the remaining alternatives, only the "No Project Alternative" successfully avoids significant impacts to the historic district. "Alternative 3: Reduced Hospital Site" does provide a reduced Project Site at approximately 4.25 acres thereby allowing for greater setbacks between new construction and historic buildings. However, the "Reduced Hospital Alternative" still fails to mitigate Project impacts to less-than-significant impact.

Conclusion

In conclusion, we do not believe the California State Hospital - Metropolitan campus, an eligible NRHP/CRHR historic district and California Historic Landmark, is suitable for the proposed Project. Therefore, we strongly encourage the state to continue their search for a

Response to Comment A-1

CHP acknowledges the historical significance of the Department of State Hospitals – Metropolitan campus and understands the importance of its link to the history of California's healthcare system.

The Conservancy's references to the JRP Historical Consulting, LLC (JRP) report regarding the history at the campus have been accurately depicted in the letter.

Response to Comment A-2

As stated in the DEIR on page 12-2, an analysis of cumulative impacts must contain certain elements to meet the adequacy standard established by State CEQA Guidelines Section 15130. These elements include: an analysis of related past, present, and reasonably foreseeable projects or planned development that would affect resources in the project area similar to those affected by the proposed project; a summary of the environmental effects expected to result from those projects with specific reference to additional information stating where that information is available; and a reasonable analysis of the combined (cumulative) impacts of the relevant projects.

As stated on page 12-2 of the DEIR, and in State CEQA Guidelines Section 15130, the discussion of cumulative impacts is not required to provide as much detail as the discussion of the effects attributable to the Proposed Project alone. Rather, the level of detail is to be guided by what is practical and reasonable.

The DEIR evaluates the Proposed Project's contribution to cumulative impacts on historic resources in addition to that of *other* reasonably foreseeable projects, including the DSH-Metropolitan Consolidation of Police Operations Project, under Impact CUM-2, *Cumulative Impacts on Historical Resources* on page 12-11. The DEIR states that the Proposed Project would result in a cumulative considerable contribution to a significant cumulative environmental effect, considering the Project's impacts and the impacts of the DSH-Metropolitan Consolidation of Police Operations on the Norwalk State Hospital Historic District (NSHHD). Thus, the cumulative effects of the Proposed Project and other projects in the vicinity on the NSHHD were fully analyzed and disclosed. In addition, the impacts of the Proposed Project, and its related actions such as road and utility improvements, were evaluated as a whole in compliance with Section 15378(a) of the CEQA Guidelines.

Apart from the Proposed Project and the DSH-Metropolitan Consolidation of Police Operations cumulatively contributing to a significant and unavoidable impact on the NSHHD and being located near each other, they are in no other way related. The two projects are separate and are not part of a larger project that has been subdivided into smaller individual subprojects as is incorrectly stated in the Conservancy's letter. Both of the projects have different lead agencies: the State Department of State Hospitals (DSH) is the lead agency for the DSH-Metropolitan Consolidation of Police Operations Project while CHP is the lead agency for the Proposed Project. Both projects receive separate funding, separate approvals, and are filed at the State Clearinghouse as two completely separate projects. Each project can and would be constructed and operated independently of the other; neither one depends on the other to be approved, constructed or operated.

Response to Comment A-3

As stated on page 13-1 of the DEIR, in determining whether alternatives are potentially feasible, the lead agencies are guided by the general definition of feasibility found in Section 15364 of the State CEQA Guidelines as follows: "...capable of being accomplished in a successful manner within a reasonable period of time, taking into account economic, environmental, legal, social, and technological factors." The alternatives described in an EIR must feasibly accomplish most of the basic Project objectives, should reduce or eliminate one or more of the significant impacts of the Proposed Project (although the alternative could have greater impacts overall), and must be potentially feasible (State CEQA Guidelines Section 15126.6[a]). CHP will make the ultimate determination of actual feasibility of the alternatives as part of its required findings under CEQA. CHP has substantial discretion to consider and weigh economic, environmental, legal, social and technological factors in making this determination.

The four Alternatives evaluated in Section 13.3 of the DEIR are all "potentially feasible" alternatives for the purposes of CEQA. Section 13.3 of the DEIR describes two offsite alternatives, a No Project Alternative, and an alternative on the Proposed Project site with a reduced area of impact. Alternative 1 (Telegraph Road Site) was withdrawn from consideration as a preferred site for the Proposed Project, and instead changed to a potential alternative site, based on issues related to cost and the landowner's unwillingness to sell. As documented in a letter to the property owner, the State attempted to purchase the property over a three-year process and made three separate offers to the seller between 2008-2011. The seller refused to accept the State's offers for the property; thus, leading the State to withdraw its purchase offer for the property. Likewise, Alternative 2 (Florence Avenue site) was withdrawn as a preferred site for the Proposed Project (but kept as a potential alternative site) due to the landowner's unwillingness to sell. At the time of the initial site search in 2013, the owner expressed an interest in only leasing the property and was unwilling to sell the property. In March 2020, after publication of the Draft EIR, the Florence Site Alternative's property was made available for sale at the cost of approximately \$11.5 million (LoopNet 2020). As indicated in an article in the Downey Patriot, this property is the site of the former Bob Spreen Cadillac dealership, was constructed in the mid 20th century. and has unique onsite features that support that the site should be preserved and reused by future tenants. The Downey Conservancy, a local nonprofit organization, recommends the reuse of the onsite building. The property listing for this site also indicates that historic resource restoration and repurposing of the existing building are desired. Repurposing the existing building would not provide sufficient space or be economically reasonable for the Proposed Project. In addition, the Proposed Project site is available and of no charge for CHP's use for the Proposed Project (only a transfer of jurisdiction between state agencies is required). In summary, purchase of the Florence Avenue Alternative Site would cost the State \$11.5 million and require repurposing of an existing 50-year old building at additional expense and schedule delay. Further, the property was only listed for sale as of March 2020, which occurred after the release of the Project's Draft EIR.

The acquisition of the Alternatives 1 and 2 sites was fully explored by DGS' Real Estate Division, and during the site search period (2008-2013), each landowner stated that they refused to sell the respective properties. As such, these sites were not moved forward as preferred options for the Project's detailed CEQA analysis but were kept as potentially feasible alternatives since these sites met many of the other site evaluation criteria (as described in Section 13.3), and could be acquired for the Proposed Project should the

landowners be willing to sell. Additionally, the four alternatives proposed would reduce or eliminate the potential cultural resources-related impacts of the Proposed Project. Thus, all four of the proposed Alternatives, including Alternatives 1 and 2, are potentially feasible and were therefore fully evaluated in the DEIR.

An EIR must briefly describe the rationale for selection and rejection of alternatives evaluated in the EIR and the information on which the lead agency relied in making the selection. It also should identify any alternatives that were considered by the lead agency but were rejected as infeasible during the scoping process and briefly explain the reason for their exclusion (State CEQA Guidelines Section 15126.6[c]). The DEIR provides this analysis for alternatives that were considered by CHP during the site evaluation process, but were ultimately dismissed from further analysis, in Section 13.4.

Response to Comment A-4

CHP acknowledges the Conservancy's concerns regarding the proposed project's location on the DSH-Metropolitan campus and the significant and unavoidable impacts that the project will have on this NRHP/CRHR eligible historic district and state landmark. As discussed in the DEIR, implementation of Mitigation Measures 1–3 will help to lessen, but not completely avoid, the adverse effects.

Corrections of typographical errors, an updated conceptual site layout plan, and other minor edits identified after the DEIR was published have resulted in revisions to the DEIR. Those revisions are presented below. Text to be deleted is shown in strikethrough, and text that has been inserted is shown underlined. Revisions are presented in the order of appearance in the DEIR.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Mitigation Measures column in the Cultural Resources section of **Table ES-1 Summary of Potential Impacts and Mitigation Measures** on page ES-12 in the Executive Summary has been revised to include the new Mitigation Measure CR-4 and the re-numbering/updates to Mitigation Measures CR-5 and CR-6. On page ES-16 of the Tribal Cultural Resources section, Mitigation Measures TCR-1 and the new TCR-4 were added, and the previous CR-4 and CR-5 were revised to CR-5 and CR-6 to reflect the new cultural resource mitigation measure numbering,

CHAPTER 2. PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The fifth sentence on page 2-3 has been revised to correct an editorial error.

It should also be noted that the Proposed Project site is within the <u>Norwalk Newall State</u> Hospital Historic District as discussed in Chapter 6, Cultural Resources.

Figure 2-4, Conceptual Project Overview, has been updated to show a gate in two separate areas that were formerly security chicanes (see Attachment 1).

CHAPTER 5. BIOLOGICAL RESOURCES

The third sentence in the second paragraph under 5.3 Environmental Setting on page 5-3 of the DEIR has been revised to remove the word "garage."

Existing structures on the site include a baseball field, basketball court, <u>and</u> greenhouse and plant nursery<u>.</u>, and a garage.

CHAPTER 6. CULTURAL RESOURCES

The last sentence in the first paragraph under the Native American Consultation section on page 6-10 has been revised to include the consultation that occurred between the Gabrieleno Band of Mission Indians – Kizh Nation and DGS.

None of the tribes who were contacted requested consultation on the Project. One tribe, the Gabrieleno Band of Mission Indians – Kizh Nation, requested consultation on March 5, 2020.

A new mitigation measure was added to the DEIR, which shifted Mitigation Measure CR-4 down to Mitigation Measure CR-5 and Mitigation Measure CR-5 down to Mitigation Measure CR-6. The new mitigation measure became Mitigation Measure CR-4 Conduct Archaeological Sensitivity Training and Construction Monitoring. The previous Mitigation Measure CR-4 was revised to incorporate an Unanticipated Discovery Plan and became Mitigation Measure CR-5 Prepare an Unanticipated Discovery Plan, Immediately Halt Construction if Cultural Resources Are Discovered, Evaluate All Identified Cultural Resources for Eligibility for Inclusion in the CRHR, and Implement Appropriate Mitigation Measures for Eligible Resources. The previous Mitigation Measure CR-5 became Mitigation Measure CR-6 Immediately Halt Construction if Human Remains Are Discovered and Implement Applicable Provisions of the California Health and Safety Code and included a few revisions.

The second and third sentences in the second paragraph under Impact CR-2 on page 6-13 have been revised to include Mitigation Measures CR-4 and CR-5 and also discussion on the Unanticipated Discovery Plan. The new Mitigation Measure CR-4 was added on page 6-14, and revisions were made to Mitigation Measure CR-5 (on pages 6-14 and 6-15) to incorporate an Unanticipated Discovery Plan.

Should previously undiscovered archaeological resources be found, implementation of Mitigation Measures CR-4 and CR-5-1 would ensure that impacts on NRHP/CRHR-eligible archaeological sites accidentally uncovered during construction are reduced to a less-than-significant level by <u>implementing an Unanticipated Discovery Plan</u>, which includes immediately halting work if materials are discovered, evaluating the finds for NRHP/CRHR eligibility, and implementing appropriate mitigation measures, as necessary. Implementation of **Mitigation Measures** CR-4 and 5 would reduce impacts related to accidental discovery of significant archaeological resources to a level that is **less than significant with mitigation**.

<u>Mitigation Measure CR-4: Conduct archaeological sensitivity training and construction monitoring.</u>

A cultural resources awareness training program shall be provided to all construction personnel active on the project site during earth moving activities. The training shall be provided prior to the initiation of ground disturbing activities. The training will be developed and conducted in coordination with a qualified archaeologist meeting the United States Secretary of Interior guidelines for professional archaeologists and a representative or representatives from the Gabrieleno Band of Mission Indians – Kizh Nation, a tribe who participated in AB 52 consultations with DGS/CHP. The program will include relevant information regarding sensitive cultural resources, including applicable regulations, protocols for avoidance, and consequences of violating State laws and regulations. The worker cultural resources awareness program will also describe appropriate avoidance and minimization measures for resources that have the potential to be located on the project site

and will outline what to do and whom to contact if any potential archaeological resources or artifacts are encountered. The program will also underscore the requirement for confidentiality and culturally appropriate treatment of any finds of significance to Native Americans and behaviors, consistent with Native American Tribal values.

A qualified archaeological monitor and Native American monitor from the Gabrieleno Band of Mission Indians – Kizh Nation shall be retained to monitor all ground disturbing activities associated with the project, beginning with the demolition and removal of existing facilities such as the basketball and tennis courts, two shelters, the greenhouse, the existing paved areas, and other miscellaneous features, and all clearing and grubbing (including the potential removal of all onsite vegetation and trees), grading, and excavation activities, as described in Chapter 2, Section 2.4.2. Ground disturbance during the installation of building foundations, and utility trenching shall also require the presence of monitors, as shall the installation of a new water pipeline, which would extend south on Bloomfield Avenue, within the roadway, for approximately 3,300 feet.

If any cultural resources, including but not limited to structural features, bone or shell, flaked or ground stone artifacts, historic-era artifacts, human remains, or architectural remains, are encountered during any project construction activities, the archaeological monitor, in consultation with the Native American monitor, as appropriate, shall have the authority to stop work in the vicinity of the finds and implement the Unanticipated Discovery Plan and other actions identified in **Mitigation Measure CR-5**.

Mitigation Measure CR-45: Prepare an Unanticipated Discovery Plan, immediately halt construction if cultural resources are discovered, evaluate all identified cultural resources for eligibility for inclusion in the NRHP/CRHR, and implement appropriate mitigation measures for eligible resources.

An Unanticipated Discovery Plan shall be developed by the State prior to initiating construction. The Unanticipated Discovery Plan will outline protocols to be followed should there be unanticipated archaeological finds, provide for points of contact and present a timeline for notifications. Protocols for addressing Native American archaeological resources and tribal cultural resources that have been provided by the Gabrieleno Band of Mission Indians – Kizh Nation will be incorporated into the Unanticipated Discovery Plan, including the directives of Mitigation Measure TCR-1: Tribal Monitoring and Treatment of Tribal Cultural Resources. If any cultural resources, such as structural features, unusual amounts of bone or shell, flaked or ground stone artifacts, historic-era artifacts, human remains, or architectural remains, are encountered during any project construction activities, work shall be suspended immediately at the location of the find and within a radius of at least 1500 feet, and the State will be contacted. The discovered items will be recorded with photography, measurements, and GPS data, as appropriate. Tribal cultural resources will be treated in accordance with Mitigation Measure TCR-1.

All cultural resources accidentally uncovered during construction within the project site shall be evaluated for eligibility for inclusion in the NRHP/CRHR. Resource evaluations will be conducted by individuals who meet the U.S. Secretary of the Interior's professional standards in archaeology, history, or architectural history, as appropriate. Native American resources shall be evaluated in collaboration with the Gabrieleno Band of Mission Indians – Kizh Nation. If any of the resources meet the eligibility criteria identified in Public Resources Code § 5024.1 or CEQA § 21083.2(g), mitigation measures shall be developed and implemented in

accordance with CEQA Guidelines § 15126.4(b) or 21083.2(b), respectively, before construction resumes.

The disposition of materials related to tribal cultural resources and Native American burials will be determined according to Mitigation Measure TCR-1. The disposition of historic era artifacts will be outlined in the Unanticipated Discovery Plan.

For resources eligible for listing in the CRHR that would be rendered ineligible by the effects of Project construction, additional mitigation measures will be implemented. Mitigation measures for archaeological resources may include (but are not limited to) avoidance; incorporation of sites within parks, greenspace, or other open space; capping the site; deeding the site into a permanent conservation easement; or data recovery excavation. Mitigation measures for archaeological resources shall be developed in consultation with responsible agencies and, as appropriate, interested parties such as Native American tribes. Native American consultation is required if an archaeological site is determined to be a TCR. Implementation of the approved mitigation would be required before resuming any construction activities with potential to affect identified eligible resources at the site.

The fourth sentence in the first paragraph under Impact CR-3 on page 6-16 was revised to state Mitigation Measure CR-6.

Implementation of **Mitigation Measure CR-**65 would ensure that the Proposed Project would not result in any substantial adverse effects on human remains uncovered during the course of construction by requiring that, if human remains are uncovered, work must be halted and the County Coroner must be contacted. *Mitigation Measure CR-5 was changed to the title of Mitigation Measure CR-6 on page 6-16, and revisions were made to the first, second, second to last, and last sentences in the mitigation measure.*

Mitigation Measure CR-<u>65</u>: Immediately halt construction if human remains are discovered and implement applicable provisions of the California Health and Safety Code.

If human remains, including cremations, are accidentally discovered during the Proposed Project's construction activities, the requirements of California Health and Human Safety Code § 7050.5 shall be followed. Potentially damaging excavation shall halt in the project site vicinity of the remains, with a minimum radius of 100 feet, and the Los Angeles County Coroner shall be notified. The Coroner is required to examine all discoveries of human remains within 48 hours of receiving notice of a discovery on private or state lands (California Health and Safety Code § 7050.5[b]). If the Coroner determines that the remains are those of a Native American, he or she must contact NAHC by phone within 24 hours of making that determination (California Health and Safety Code § 7050[c]). Pursuant to the provisions of Pub. Res. Code § 5097.98, the NAHC shall identify a Most Likely Descendent (MLD). The MLD designated by the NAHC shall have at least 48 hours to inspect the site and propose treatment and disposition of the remains and any associated grave goods. The State shall work with the MLD to ensure that the remains are removed to a protected location and treated with dignity and respect. Native American human remains may also be determined to be tribal cultural resources. Details for the treatment of discovered human remains will be included in the Unanticipated Discovery Plan and will follow the protocols outlined by the Gabrieleno Band of Mission Indians - Kizh Nation. The County Coroner will contend with the human remains if they are not of Native American origin or archaeological (early historic era) in nature.

CHAPTER 11. TRIBAL CULTURAL RESOURCES

The fourth, fifth, and sixth sentences in the first paragraph in the Environmental Setting section on pages 11-2 and 11-3 were revised to include the consultation correspondence between DGS and the Gabrieleno Band of Mission Indians – Kizh Nation.

DGS did not <u>immediately</u> receive any tribal requests for consultation on the Proposed Project; however, the Gabrieleno Band of Mission Indians – Kizh Nation (Kizh Nation) requested consultation via email on March 5, 2020. Consultation between the Kizh Nation and DGS is <u>summarized below.</u> Table TCR-1 lists all those contacted, and summarizes the results of the consultation. All correspondence between the NAHC, Native American Tribes, and the State is provided in **Appendix F**.

The last column in the first row in Table TCR-1 on page 11-3 has been revised to include the tribal response from the Gabrieleno Band of Mission Indians – Kizh Nation.

A section has been added under **Table TCR-1 Native American Consultation** on pages 11-3 and 11-4 that discusses the consultation correspondence between the Gabrieleno Band of Mission Indians – Kizh Nation (Kizh Nation) and DGS.

Kizh Nation

DGS and the Kizh Nation entered into consultation, and a conference call was held between the parties on April 21, 2020. The tribe expressed concerns about the Project site because it is within the boundaries of Rancho Los Nietos, which included numerous large Kizh Nation communities.

Based on conversations between the Kizh Nation and DGS, as well as documentation provided by the tribe, mitigation measures CR-4, CR-5, and TCR-1 were developed and agreed upon. Once the mitigation measure language was acceptable to both the Kizh Nation and DGS, consultation was concluded on August 20, 2020 via email.

The paragraph under Impact TCR-2 on page 11-5 has been revised to include the consultation correspondence between the Kizh Nation and DGS, the new Mitigation Measures TCR-1 and CR-4, and the revised Mitigation Measures CR-5 and CR-6. Mitigation Measure TCR-1 Tribal Monitoring and Treatment of Tribal Cultural Resources was added under this paragraph.

As mentioned above, <u>DGS</u> consulted with <u>Kizh Nation</u> and the parties agreed on mitigation language to treat although DGS notified tribes with a traditional and cultural affiliation within the area about the Proposed Project, none of the tribes contacted identified TCRs in the Project area. Furthermore, no TCRs determined by the lead agency, in its discretion and supported by substantial evidence, to be significant are known to be located in the Project vicinity. As a result, it appears that there would be no impact to TCRs, However, it is possible that Native American archaeological remains or Native American human remains that could be determined to be TCRs could be discovered during the course of construction. If such resources are identified, they would be treated according to **Mitigation Measure TCR-1**, in combination with or **Mitigation Measures CR-4**, **CR-5**, and **CR-6**, respectively as described in Chapter 6, *Cultural Resources*, as appropriate. Implementation of these mitigation measures would result in a less-than-significant impact with regard to TCRs. As a result, this impact would be **less than significant with mitigation**.

<u>Mitigation Measure TCR-1: Tribal Monitoring and Treatment of Tribal Cultural Resources.</u>

Prior to the commencement of any ground disturbing activity at the project site, the project applicant shall retain a Native American Monitor approved by the Gabrieleno Band of Mission Indians-Kizh Nation – the tribe that consulted on this project pursuant to Assembly Bill (AB) 52 (the "Tribe" or the "Consulting Tribe"). The Tribal monitor will only be present on-site during the construction phases that involve ground-disturbing activities. Ground-disturbing activities are defined by the Tribe as activities that may include, but are not limited to, pavement removal, potholing or auguring, grubbing, tree removals, boring, grading, excavation, drilling, and trenching, within the project area. The Tribal Monitor will complete daily monitoring logs that will provide descriptions of the day's activities, including construction activities, locations, soil, and any cultural materials identified. The on-site monitoring shall end when all ground-disturbing activities on the Project Site are completed, or when the Tribal Representatives and Tribal Monitor have indicated that all upcoming ground-disturbing activities at the Project Site have little to no potential for impacting Tribal Cultural Resources. Upon discovery of any Tribal Cultural Resources, construction activities shall cease in the immediate vicinity of the find (not less than the surrounding 100 feet) until the find can be assessed. All Tribal Cultural Resources unearthed by project activities shall be evaluated by the qualified archaeologist and Tribal monitor approved by the Consulting Tribe. If the resources are Native American in origin, the Consulting Tribe will retain it/them in the form and/or manner the Tribe deems appropriate, for educational, cultural and/or historic purposes. If human remains and/or grave goods are discovered or recognized at the Project Site, all ground disturbance shall immediately cease, and the county coroner shall be notified per Public Resources Code Section 5097.98, and Health & Safety Code Section 7050.5. Human remains and grave/burial goods shall be treated alike per California Public Resources Code section 5097.98(d)(1) and (2). Work may continue on other parts of the Project Site while evaluation and, if necessary, mitigation takes place (CEQA Guidelines Section 15064.5[f]).

CHAPTER 12. OTHER STATUTORY CONSIDERATIONS

In Table 12-1 on page 12-4, the Rationale column under Tribal Cultural Resources has been updated to reflect the new numbering of the cultural resource mitigation measures and to add the tribal cultural resource mitigation measure.

Similar to the Proposed Project, other development projects in the Project area would be required to implement mitigation measures similar to Mitigation Measures <u>CR-41 and</u>, CR-<u>5</u>, <u>CR-6</u>, <u>and TCR-12</u> in the event that any archaeological resources or human remains are encountered during construction.

On page 12-11, the words "and Unavoidable" should be added after the word "Significant" in the title of Impact CUM-2 and at the end of the sentence in the second paragraph. The text has been revised to incorporate these changes.

Impact CUM-2: Cumulative Impacts on Historical Resources (Significant and Unavoidable)

As a result, this impact would be significant and unavoidable.

CHAPTER 13. ALTERNATIVES

The last sentence in the fourth paragraph on page 13-5 has been revised to correct a few editorial errors.

This property was one of the original sites considered for the new CHP Area Office but was withdrawn from consideration because of issues with cost and the owner's <u>un</u>willingness to sell.

The last bullet in the "Impacts Compared to the Proposed Project" column on page 13-16 has been revised to correct an editorial error.

The site would be of sufficient size to accommodate increasing number of employees to serve the Project area, although potentially not large enough to accommodate all identified program-related improvements. and accommodate all identified program-related improvements.

Appendix A – Native American Correspondence, found in Appendix F – Cultural Resources of the DEIR, has been amended to include email correspondence between the Gabrieleno Band of Mission Indians – Kizh Nation and DGS regarding AB 52 consultation and cultural and tribal cultural resource mitigation measures (see Attachment 2).

APPENDIX I. MITIGATION MONITORING AND REPORTING PROGRAM

Formatting changes have been made throughout the MMRP to align the numbering of the "Contractor Responsibility", "State Responsibility", and "Monitoring Schedule" columns.

The first items under the column titled "State Responsibility" for Mitigation Measures CR-1 and CR-2 have been moved to the first items under the column titled "Contractor Responsibility" for both of the mitigation measures. An editorial edit has been made to the third item in the "State Responsibility" column for Mitigation Measure CR-1.

A new cultural resources mitigation measure has been added as CR-4 and includes the archaeological sensitivity training and construction monitoring. The previous Mitigation

Measure CR-4 has been shifted to Mitigation Measure CR-5 and has been revised to include an Unanticipated Discovery Plan. The previous Mitigation Measure CR-5 has been shifted to Mitigation Measure CR-6. Edits have been made to Mitigation Measures CR-5 and CR-6.

The first sentence in the "Implement Vibration-reducing Measures" column in the Noise section has been revised to correct an editorial error.

A new mitigation measure, TCR-1, has been added to Tribal Cultural Resources.

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

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

Please find this letter as a written request for consultation regarding the above-mentioned project pursuant to Public Resources Code § 21080.3.1, subd. (d). Your project lies within our ancestral tribal territory, meaning belonging to or inherited from, which is a higher degree of kinship than traditional or cultural affiliation. Your project is located within a sensitive area and may cause a substantial adverse change in the significance of our tribal cultural resources. Most often, a records search for our tribal cultural resources will result in a "no records found" for the project area. The Native American Heritage Commission (NAHC), ethnographers, historians, and professional archaeologists can only provide limited information that has been previously documented about California Native Tribes. For this reason, the NAHC will always refer the lead agency to the respective Native American Tribe of the area. The NAHC is only aware of general information and are not the experts on each California Tribe. Our Elder Committee & tribal historians are the experts for our Tribe and can provide a more complete history (both written and oral) regarding the location of historic villages, trade routes, cemeteries and sacred/religious sites in the project area.

Additionally, CEQA now defines Tribal Cultural Resources (TCRs) as their own independent element separate from archaeological resources. Environmental documents shall now address a separate Tribal Cultural Resource section which includes a thorough analysis of the impacts to only Tribal Cultural Resources (TCRs) and includes independent mitigation measures created with Tribal input during AB-52 consultations. As a result, all mitigation measures, conditions of approval and agreements regarding TCRs (i.e. prehistoric resources) shall be handled solely with the Tribal Government and not through an Environmental/Archaeological firm.

In effort to avoid adverse effects to our tribal cultural resources, we would like to consult with you and your staff to provide you with a more complete understanding of the prehistoric use(s) of the project area and the potential risks for causing a substantial adverse change to the significance of our tribal cultural resources.



Thank you for your time during the AB52 consultation for the project at 11401 Bloomfield Ave in the City of Santa Fe Springs.

As stated in the Public Resource Code section 21080.3.1. (a) The Legislature finds and declares that California Native American tribes traditionally and culturally affiliated with a geographic area may have expertise concerning their tribal cultural resources and an area that has cultural value. According to section 21074. (a) "Tribal cultural resources" can be sites, features, places, cultural landscapes, sacred places, and objects with cultural value to a California Native American tribe.

Therefore, to explain our concerns for impacts to tribal cultural resources (TCR's) and how this project location may impact TCR's due to the location and the proposed ground disturbing activities, attached are screenshots and some explanatory text that was also verbally explained in the phone consultation for your project location.





destroying Tribal Cultural Resources that may be inadvertently unearthed during the project's ground disturbing activities and pursuant to our consultation, we have provided to the Lead Agency substantial evidence that the proposed project may have a significant impact on our TCRs. "... [T]ribal Cultural Resources include, but are not limited to, sites, features, places, or objects with cultural value to descendant communities, traditional culture properties, or tribal cultural landscapes consistent with the guidance of the federal National Park Services' Advisory Council on Historic Preservation." (AB 52, Natural Resources Agency, at p. 2.) Moreover, Public Resources Code ("PRC") Section 21084.2 states that "[a] project with an effect that may cause a substantial adverse change in the significance of a tribal cultural resource is a project that may have a significant effect on the environment." A project that may have a significant effect on the environment requires appropriate mitigation. (PRC § 21082.3(b).) Through the consultation process, AB 52 authorized California Native American tribes to assist lead agencies in identifying, interpreting, and determining the significance of TCRs. (See AB 52, Legislative Digest.) Unless the environmental document includes mitigation measures agreed on during the consultation process, "if substantial evidence demonstrates" the project "will cause" a significant effect to a TCR, the agency must "consider" feasible mitigation measures "pursuant to" Pub Res C §21084.3(b).

As well, Consultation is not deemed concluded for purposes of CEQA until the parties agree to measures to mitigate or avoid a significant effect on a tribal cultural resource, or when a party concludes, after a reasonable effort, that mutual agreement cannot be reached. (PRC §21080.3.2(b).) Any mitigation measures agreed on during the consultation process must be recommended by lead agency staff for inclusion in the environmental document and the mitigation monitoring and reporting program for the project pursuant to section 21082.3(a) of the PRC. Moreover, now that consultation has begun, as the lead agency, you may certify an EIR or adopt a mitigated negative declaration for the subject project (which that may have a significant impact on a tribal cultural resource) only after consultation has concluded. (PRC §21082.3(d).)

Please find attached the proposed mitigation measures for the subject project. Once you have

reviewed them, please provide written notification to the Tribe stating whether and to what extent you will include and require the proposed mitigations for TCR for the subject project so that we may conclude our consultation, and if you do not agree with the mitigations as proposed, so that we may continue our consultation discussions in an effort to reach an agreement.

The region where Gabrieleño culture thrived for more than eight centuries encompassed most of Los Angeles County, more than half of Orange County and portions of Riverside and San Bernardino counties. It was the labor of the Gabrieleño who built the missions, ranchos and the pueblos of Los Angeles. They were trained in the trades, and they did the construction and maintenance, as well as the farming and managing of herds of livestock. "The Gabrieleño are the ones who did all this work, and they really are the foundation of the early economy of the Los Angeles area ". "That's a contribution that Los Angeles has not recognized—the fact that in its early decades, without the Gabrieleño, the community simply would not have survived."



MITIGATION MEASURES

Retain a Native American Monitor/Consultant: The Project Applicant shall be required to retain and compensate for the services of a Tribal monitor/consultant who is both ancestrally affiliated with the project area and approved by the Gabrieleño Band of Mission Indians-Kizh Nation Tribal Government and is listed under the Native American Heritage Commission's (NAHC) Tribal Contact list for the area of the project location. This list is provided by the NAHC. A Native American monitor shall be retained by the Lead Agency or owner of the project to be on site to monitor all project-related, ground-disturbing construction activities (i.e., boring, grading, excavation, potholing, trenching, etc.). A monitor associated with one of the NAHC recognized Tribal governments which have commented on the project shall provide the Native American monitor. The monitor/consultant will only be present on-site during the construction phases that involve ground disturbing activities. Ground disturbing activities are defined by the Gabrieleño Band of Mission Indians-Kizh Nation as activities that may include, but are not limited to, pavement removal, pot-holing or auguring, grubbing, tree removals, boring, grading, excavation, drilling, and trenching, within the project area. The Tribal Monitor/consultant will complete daily monitoring logs that will provide descriptions of the day's activities, including construction activities, locations, soil, and any cultural materials identified. The on-site monitoring shall end when the project site grading and excavation activities are completed, or when the Tribal Representatives and monitor/consultant have indicated that the site has a low potential for impacting Tribal Cultural Resources.

Unanticipated Discovery of Tribal Cultural and Archaeological Resources: Upon discovery of any tribal cultural or archaeological resources, cease construction activities in the immediate vicinity of the find until the find can be assessed. All tribal cultural and archaeological resources unearthed by project construction activities shall be evaluated by the qualified archaeologist and tribal monitor/consultant. If the resources are Native American in origin, the Gabrieleño Band of Mission Indians-Kizh Nation shall coordinate with the landowner regarding treatment and curation of these resources. Typically, the Tribe will request preservation in place or recovery for educational purposes. Work may continue on other parts of the project while evaluation and, if necessary, additional protective mitigation takes place (CEQA Guidelines Section15064.5 [f]). If a resource is determined by the qualified archaeologist to constitute a "historical resource" or "unique archaeological resource", time allotment and funding sufficient to allow for implementation of avoidance measures, or appropriate mitigation, must be available. The treatment plan established for the resources shall be in accordance with CEQA Guidelines Section 15064.5(f) for historical resources.

Public Resources Code Sections 21083.2(b) for unique archaeological resources. Preservation in place (i.e., avoidance) is the preferred manner of treatment. If preservation in place is not feasible, treatment may include implementation of archaeological data recovery excavations to remove the resource along with subsequent laboratory processing and analysis. All Tribal Cultural Resources shall be returned to the Tribe. Any historic archaeological material that is not Native American in origin shall be curated at a public, non-profit institution with a research interest in the materials, if such an institution agrees to accept the material. If no institution accepts the archaeological material, they shall be offered to the Tribe or a local school or historical society in the area for educational purposes.

Unanticipated Discovery of Human Remains and Associated Funerary Objects:

Native American human remains are defined in PRC 5097.98 (d)(1) as an inhumation or cremation, and in any state of decomposition or skeletal completeness. Funerary objects, called associated grave goods in PRC 5097.98, are also to be treated according to this statute. Health and Safety Code 7050.5 dictates that any discoveries of human skeletal material shall be immediately reported to the County Coroner and excavation halted until the coroner has determined the nature of the remains. If the coroner recognizes the human remains to be those of a Native American or has reason to believe that they are those of a Native American, he or she shall contact, by telephone within 24 hours, the NAHC and PRC 5097.98 shall be followed.



Resource Assessment & Continuation of Work Protocol:

Upon discovery of human remains, the tribal and/or archaeological monitor/consultant/consultant will immediately divert work at minimum of 150 feet and place an exclusion zone around the discovery location. The monitor/consultant(s) will then notify the Tribe, the qualified lead archaeologist, and the construction manager who will call the coroner. Work will continue to be diverted while the coroner determines whether the remains are human and subsequently Native American. The discovery is to be kept confidential and secure to prevent any further disturbance. If the finds are determined to be Native American, the coroner will notify the NAHC as mandated by state law who will then appoint a Most Likely Descendent (MLD).

Kizh-Gabrieleno Procedures for burials and funerary remains:

If the Gabrieleno Band of Mission Indians - Kizh Nation is designated MLD, the Koo-nas-gna Burial Policy shall be implemented. To the Tribe, the term "human remains" encompasses more than human bones. In ancient as well as historic times, Tribal Traditions included, but were not limited to, the preparation of the soil for burial, the burial of funerary objects with the deceased, and the ceremonial burning of human remains. The prepared soil and cremation soils are to be treated in the same manner as bone fragments that remain intact. Associated funerary objects are objects that, as part of the death rite or ceremony of a culture, are reasonably believed to have been placed with individual human remains either at the time of death or later; other items made exclusively for burial purposes or to contain human remains can also be considered as associated funerary objects.

Treatment Measures:

Prior to the continuation of ground disturbing activities, the landowner shall arrange a designated site location within the footprint of the project for the respectful reburial of the human remains and/or ceremonial objects. In the case where discovered human remains cannot be fully documented and recovered on the same day, the remains will be covered with muslin cloth and a steel plate that can be moved by heavy equipment placed over the excavation opening to protect the remains. If this type of steel plate is not available, a 24-hour guard should be posted outside of working hours. The Tribe will make every effort to recommend diverting the project and keeping the remains in situ and protected. If the project cannot be diverted, it may be determined that burials will be removed. The Tribe will work closely with the qualified archaeologist to ensure that the excavation is treated carefully, ethically and respectfully. If data recovery is approved by the Tribe, documentation shall be taken which includes at a minimum detailed descriptive notes and sketches. Additional types of documentation shall be approved by the Tribe for data recovery purposes. Cremations will either be removed in bulk or by means as necessary to ensure completely recovery of all material. If the discovery of human remains includes four or more burials, the location is considered a cemetery and a separate treatment plan shall be created. Once complete, a final report of all activities is to be submitted to the Tribe and the NAHC. The Tribe does NOT authorize any scientific study or the utilization of any invasive and/or destructive diagnostics on human remains.

Each occurrence of human remains and associated funerary objects will be stored using opaque cloth bags. All human remains, funerary objects, sacred objects and objects of cultural patrimony will be removed to a secure container on site if possible. These items should be retained and reburied within six months of recovery. The site of reburial/repatriation shall be on the project site but at a location agreed upon between the Tribe and the landowner at a site to be protected in perpetuity. There shall be no publicity regarding any cultural materials recovered.



Professional Standards: Archaeological and Native American monitoring and excavation during construction projects will be consistent with current professional standards. All feasible care to avoid any unnecessary disturbance, physical modification, or separation of human remains and associated funerary objects shall be taken. Principal personnel must meet the Secretary of Interior standards for archaeology and have a minimum of 10 years of experience as a principal investigator working with Native American archaeological sites in southern California. The Qualified Archaeologist shall ensure that all other personnel are appropriately trained and qualified.

The mitigation measures should be specific to TCR for purposes of complying with CEQA therefore please utilize the attached mitigation measures for your project . Thank you

MM TCR-1 Prior to the commencement of any ground disturbing activity at the project site, the project applicant shall retain a Native American Monitor approved by the Gabrieleno Band of Mission Indians-Kizh Nation – the tribe that consulted on this project pursuant to Assembly Bill A52 (the "Tribe" or the "Consulting Tribe"). A copy of the executed contract shall be submitted to the City of Santa Fe Springs Planning and Building Department prior to the issuance of any permit necessary to commence a grounddisturbing activity. The Tribal monitor will only be present on-site during the construction phases that involve ground-disturbing activities. Ground disturbing activities are defined by the Tribe as activities that may include, but are not limited to, pavement removal, potholing or auguring, grubbing, tree removals, boring, grading, excavation, drilling, and trenching, within the project area. The Tribal Monitor will complete daily monitoring logs that will provide descriptions of the day's activities, including construction activities, locations, soil, and any cultural materials identified. The on-site monitoring shall end when all ground-disturbing activities on the Project Site are completed, or when the Tribal Representatives and Tribal Monitor have indicated that all upcoming grounddisturbing activities at the Project Site have little to nopotential for impacting Tribal Cultural Resources. Upon discovery of any Tribal Cultural Resources, construction activities shall cease in the immediate vicinity of the find (not less than the surrounding 100 feet) until the find can be assessed. All Tribal Cultural Resources unearthed by project activities shall be evaluated by the qualified archaeologist and Tribal monitor approved by the Consulting Tribe. If the resources are Native American in origin, the Consulting Tribe will retain it/them in the form and/or manner the Tribe deems appropriate, for educational, cultural and/or historic purposes. If human remains and/or grave goods are discovered or recognized at the Project Site, all ground disturbance shall immediately cease, and the county coroner shall be notified per Public Resources Code Section 5097.98, and Health & Safety Code Section 7050.5. Human remains and grave/burialgoods shall be treated alike per California Public Resources Code section 5097.98(d)(1) and (2). Work may continue on other parts of the Project Site while evaluation and, if necessary, mitigation takes place (CEQA Guidelines Section 15064.5[f]). If a non-Native American resource is determined by the qualified archaeologist to constitute a "historical resource" or "unique archaeological resource," time allotment and funding sufficient to allow for implementation of avoidance measures, or appropriate mitigation, must be available. The treatment plan established for the resources shall be in accordance with CEQA Guidelines Section 15064.5(f) for historical resources and PRC Sections 21083.2(b) for unique archaeological resources. Preservation in place (i.e., avoidance) is the preferred manner of treatment. If preservation in place is not feasible, treatment may include implementation of archaeological data recovery excavations to remove the resource along with subsequent laboratory processing and analysis. Any historic archaeological material that is not Native American in origin shall be curated at a public, non-profit institution with a research interest in the materials, such as the Natural History Museum of Los Angeles County or the Fowler Museum, if such an institution agrees to accept the material. If no institution accepts the archaeological material, it shall be offered to a local school or historical society in the area for educational purposes.

Thank you for your mitigation measure language. We have created Mitigation Measure TCR-1, and used your language verbatim, as requested. We have made two edits to MM TCR-1 for clarity within our CEQA document.

First, because the State does not obtain local jurisdiction permits for projects located on state property, we have removed the following sentence: "A copy of the executed contract shall be submitted to the City of Santa Fe Springs Planning and Building Department prior to the issuance of any permit necessary to commence a ground-disturbing activity."

Second, we have moved the last few sentences addressing non-Native American resource discoveries back to the Cultural Resources section under MM CR-4, CR-5, and CR-6. We have also added references to MM TCR-1 within MM CR-5.

Also, for your planning purposes, we wanted to let you know that due to state budgetary considerations, our current estimated schedule for construction is approximately 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ years out.


