Project Description

The proposed side slope repair project is located along State Route 99 within the City of Selma. The excavated side slopes have created holes, caves and benches for unsheltered encampments. These excavations pose a threat to the traveling public and individuals using the unsheltered encampments if they were to collapse. Work includes importing borrow fill material, backfilling/compacting operations and adding a 6-inch layer of mulch.

Trash from homeless encampments may be present at several locations and would need to be disposed of at a municipal solid waste landfill (plastic, tarps, tents, etc.) or at a Class I Landfill (needles, syringes, gas cylinders, etc).

Follow Caltrans Standard Specifications for dust control (14-9.02 Air Pollution Control and 10-5 Dust Control).

If unanticipated fossil discovery would occur during construction Specification 14-7.03 identifies procedures required to protect the resource.

If the project disturbs one acre or more of soil, the following requirements would be required:

- A Notification of Intent (NOI) is to be submitted to the appropriate Regional Water
- Quality Control Board at least 30 days before the start of construction.
- A Stormwater Pollution Prevention Plan (SWPPP) is to be prepared and implemented during construction to the satisfaction of the Resident Engineer.
- A Notice of Termination (NOT) shall be submitted to the Regional Board upon completion of construction and site stabilization. A project will be considered complete when the criteria for final stabilization in the Construction General Permit are met.

If the project disturbs less than one acre of soil, a Water Pollution Control Plan (WPCP) is required to be prepared by the contractor following the Caltrans 2018 Standard Specification Section 13-1 – Water Pollution.

Biology Best Management Practices:

- A monitor will be required for work at the excavation near McCall Avenue.
- Between Feb 1 – Sept 30 nesting bird surveys will be conducted by a qualified biologist no more than thirty (30) days prior to the beginning of ground disturbance or construction activities.
- After pre-construction surveys, if sensitive biological resources are observed, Caltrans may require environmental training for all personnel associated with the project.
- If nesting birds are found within the project area, the project may require a biological monitor or Environmentally Sensitive Area buffer depending on the extent of work and species affected. Surveys for migratory birds and raptors will be completed no more than (30) days prior to construction and these surveys will be completed by a qualified biologist.



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- No work should be done within a 500-foot buffer of any active raptor nests. If work must be done within 500 feet of an active raptor nest, the project may require a biological monitor or depending on the extent of work and species affected.

If any special status species are observed during construction activity within 150 feet shall cease immediately. Work may resume after the project biologist has been consulted and the resident engineer has given written permission to resume work.

All vehicle operators will check under vehicles and equipment prior to operation.

All food related trash items waste products shall be disposed of off-site.

If any wildlife is encountered during construction, said wildlife shall be allowed to freely leave the area unharmed.
