Project Description

The California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) proposes an emergency project to replace the existing storm drain line at post mile 25.58 on the shoulder of northbound Interstate (I) 5, in San Joaquin County. The existing High-Density Polyethylene (HDPE) pipe was damaged in an uncontrolled fire. The existing Flared End Section (FES) detached, creating a void in the shoulder embankment. The scope of work includes removing the existing 12-inch HDPE pipe, FES, and other remnants of the fire damaged storm drain. A new 18-inch Reinforced Concrete Pipe (RCP) will be installed with an 18-inch concrete FES, Rock Slope Protection will be replenished, and the embankment will be regraded and recompacted. All work will occur within Caltrans Right of Way. The purpose of this project is to restore function to the storm drain and stabilize the shoulder embankment. The project is needed to prevent failure of the embankment that supports the travel way lanes and ensure the safety of the traveling public.

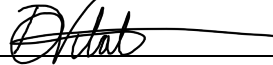

Cultural –

- If human remains are discovered, State Health and Safety Code Section 7050.5 states that further disturbances and activities shall cease in any area or nearby area suspected to overlie remains, and the County Coroner should be contacted. Pursuant to Public Resources Code Section 5097.98, if the remains are thought to be Native American, the coroner will notify the Native American Heritage Commission (NAHC) which will then notify the Most Likely Descendent (MLD). At that time, the landowner will work with the MLD on the respectful treatment and disposition of the remains. Further provisions of PRC 5097.98 are to be followed as applicable.

Biology –

- If construction occurs during the migratory bird nesting season (February 1 – September 30), a preconstruction bird survey will be required within 14 days before the start of any construction activities. Contact the Environmental office 1 month prior to the start of construction to schedule the survey. Include Caltrans Standard Special Provision (SSP) 14-6.03A in the contract. If an active nest is discovered, a 100-foot protective buffer will need to be established around it. If an active hawk nest is observed, a 300-foot protective buffer will be required. If an active Swainson's hawk nest is observed, a 600-foot buffer will be required.
