Project Decription (Proposed actions, location, and/or consequences).

The project is located at 9644 Betabel Road, in unincorporated San Benito County (County) approximately 2 miles south of Sargent and 4 miles north of San Juan Bautista. The junction of US 101 and State Route 156 is three miles south of the project site.

The project site is an approximately 116-acre property consisting of three legal parcels, assigned Assessor's Parcel Numbers: 013-150-026, 013-150-027, 013-150-030, 013-150-031, 013-150-032, and 013-150-033. The property is bordered by Betabel Road and US 101 to the east, the Betabel RV Park to the north, and agricultural/open space to the south and west. The Pajaro and San Benito rivers are located to the west and south of the property, respectively. The disturbance area associated with development of the project consists of approximately 32 acres.

The project would create 108,425 square feet of commercial space, consisting of a gas station with convenience store, a restaurant, amusement buildings with exhibits, a motel and banquet hall with outdoor pool and outdoor movie screen, and an outdoor event center. The design of the project would be reminiscent of the 1940s and 1950s American roadside. The project would also improve Betabel Road and convert a portion from a county road to a private road.
