RE: NOTICE OF PREPARATION (NOP) OF A DRAFT ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT REPORT (DEIR) FOR THE FIVE WOUNDS URBAN VILLAGE PLAN UPDATE DATED MARCH 11, 2024 STATE CLEARINGHOUSE #2024030360

Dear Tina Garg,

The Department of Toxic Substances Control (DTSC) received a NOP of a DEIR for the Five Wounds Urban Village Plan Update (project). The project would create a new "Five Wounds Urban Village" Plan (plan) that would govern land use and transportation development in the area through 2040. The new plan would incorporate the existing urban villages located in the project area (Five Wounds Urban Village, Roosevelt Park Urban Village, Little Portugal Urban Village, and the 24th and William Urban Village) into a single plan that reflects the anticipated development potential of the area following construction. The stand-alone Roosevelt Park Urban Village, Little Portugal Urban Village, and the 24th and William Urban Village Plans will be retired. The project would modify the planned job and housing capacities of the project area from approximately 4,855 jobs and 2,022 housing units to 2,500 jobs and 8,022 housing units. The decrease in job capacity and increase in housing capacity would result in a

net zero change in capacity under the Envision San José 2040 General Plan (General Plan), with jobs and housing units being distributed to and from, respectively, other urban villages throughout San José. Based on our project review; we request consideration of the following comments:

- 1. The proposed Project encompasses multiple active and nonactive mitigation and clean-up sites where DTSC has conducted oversight that may be impacted as a result of this Project. This may restrict what construction activities are permissible in the proposed Project areas in order to avoid any impacts to human health and the environment.
- 2. Due to the broad scope of the Project, DTSC is unable to determine the locations of the proposed sites, whether they are listed as having documented contamination, land use restrictions, or whether there is the potential for the sites to be included on a list of hazardous materials sites compiled pursuant to Government Code Section 65962.5. Therefore, DTSC recommends providing further information on the proposed project and areas that may fall under DTSC's oversight within future environmental documents. Once received, DTSC may provide additional comments on the future environmental documents as further information becomes available. Please review the project area in <a href="EnviroStor">EnviroStor</a>; DTSC's public-facing database.

DTSC believes the City of San Jose must address these comments to determine if any significant impacts under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) will occur and, if necessary, avoid significant impacts under CEQA. DTSC recommends the department connect with our unit if any hazardous waste projects managed or overseen by DTSC are discovered.
