Purpose

This Middle-Mile Broadband Network project will install the broadband infrastructure along the State Highway System (SHS) and Interstate System necessary to connect to a third-party operated Last Mile Broadband Network which will bring internet connectivity to homes, businesses, and community institutions.

Need

In July 2021, California Governor Gavin Newsom signed into law Senate Bill (SB) 156 to create an open-access middle-mile network to bring equitable high-speed broadband service to all Californians. The lack of available middle-mile broadband infrastructure has been a major issue in connecting California's unserved and underserved communities. The statewide open-access middle-mile network included in SB 156 is a foundational investment to ensure every Californian has access to broadband internet service that meets the connectivity needs of today, and well into the future. This project intends to support these communities in providing critical statewide broadband infrastructure to enhance access to and increase the affordability of high-speed internet for all Californians.

Work would occur at the following locations:

- Hub 58, SR 20, PM 38.0, Colusa County
- Hub 109, SR 32, PM R5.1, Glenn County
- Hub 116, I-80, PM R59.7, Nevada County
- Hub 117, I-80, PM 41.6, Placer County
- Hub 122, I-80, PM 13.7, Nevada County
- Hub 123, SR 99, PM 3.6, Sacramento County

Scope of Work

Work includes the following:

- Removal of minor vegetation at all hub locations. Hub location 117 may require the removal of trees.
- Construction of one (1) approximately 13.75-feet-wide-by 21.5-feet-long concrete network hub foundation at each hub location.
- Construction of one (1) approximately 12-feet-wide by 20-feet-long network hub building at each hub location.
- Installation of two (1) approximately 30-inches-wide by 48-inches-long by 36-inches-deep pull vaults at each hub location.
- Installation of two (2) approximately 48-inches-wide by 48-inches-long by 48-inches-deep splice vaults at each hub location.
- Installation of two-inch diameter high-density polyethylene conduits at each hub location.
- Installation of conductor cables and fiber optic cables at each hub location.
- Installation of one (1) approximately 20-feet-wide by 100-feet-long maintenance vehicle pullout at hub locations 109, 116, 117, and 122.



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- Installation of one (1) approximately 6-foot-wide by 18-foot-long underground 1,000-gallon propane tank at each hub location.
- Construction of one (1) approximately 5-foot-wide by 11-foot-long concrete pad for generator and installation of one (1) 60-kilowatt generator at hub locations 109, 116, and 117 and installation of one (1) 80-kilowatt generator at hub locations 58, 122, and 123.
- Installation of one (1) approximately 8-foot-tall chain link fence at each hub location.
 - Hub 58- 50-foot-wide by 50-foot-long.
 - Hub 109- 30-foot-wide by 73.5-foot-long.
 - Hub 116- 50-foot-wide by 50-foot-long.
 - Hub 117- 30-foot-wide by 71.5-foot-long.
 - Hub 122- 28.75-foot-wide by 80.5-foot-long.
 - Hub 123- 26 to 31-foot-wide by 81-foot-long.
- Installation of one (1) 8-foot-tall by 12-foot-wide chain link gate at each hub location.
- Installation of one (1) service equipment enclosure for electrical service at each hub location.
- Trenching for new electrical service approximately 12-inches-wide by 40-inches-deep at each hub location.
 - Hub 58- approximately 506 linear feet for electrical trench and 555 linear feet for fiber optic trench.
 - Hub 109- approximately 145 linear feet for electrical trench and 215 linear feet for fiber optic trench.
 - Hub 116- approximately 460 linear feet for electrical trench and 700 linear feet for fiber optic trench.
 - Hub 117- approximately 720 linear feet for electrical trench and 200 linear feet for fiber optic trench.
 - Hub 122- approximately 460 linear feet for electrical trench and 1,120 linear feet for fiber optic trench.
 - Hub 123- approximately 200 linear feet for electrical trench and 540 linear feet for fiber optic trench.
- Construction of one (1) paved driveway at the following hub locations.
 - Hub 58- approximately 20-foot-wide by 97-foot-long.
 - Hub 123- approximately 20-foot-wide by 317-foot-long.

Right of Way/Staging

All work would occur within the Caltrans right of way. All staging and storage would occur at or adjacent to the network hub shelter proposed locations within the Caltrans right of way.

Disposal/Borrow

No material borrow site is needed. Disposal of excavated material would be re-used for hub construction.



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Consultation/Coordination

Consultation was conducted with numerous Native American Tribes. No issues have been currently identified. Yoche Dehe Tribe would monitor Hub 58 and the Paskenta Tribe would monitor Hub 109 during construction.

Permits/Approvals

No environmental permits or approvals would be required.
