Project Description

The California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) proposes a field maintenance project to upgrade the existing GAZEX avalanche control system on Carson Pass. The project location is within Alpine County, off State Route 88 (SR-88) at Post Mile (PM) R5.228. The scope of work consists of replacing eight exploders and five shelters in-kind. As well as replacing the remote-control systems, plumbing, gas supply lines, and solar charging equipment associated with this system. The purpose of the project is to upgrade the existing GAZEX avalanche control system at Carson Pass. The project is needed to ensure that the existing GAZEX avalanche control system meets current functional standards for the safety of the traveling public.

Pursuant to Public Resources Code Section 5097.98, if the remains are thought to be Native American, the coroner will notify the Native American Heritage Commission (NAHC) which will then notify the Most Likely Descendent (MLD). At that time, the landowner will work with the MLD on the respectful treatment and disposition of the remains. Further provisions of PRC 5097.98 are to be followed as applicable.
